Lymphedema Management for Breast Cancer Patients: This program is led by a 2004 Georgia Cancer Coalition Distinguished Clinician, and provides outreach to the breast cancer survivors that have had surgery and radiotherapy and are cared for in the Grady Cancer Center by Winship faculty. The program provides education in manual lymphatic drainage, long term lymphedema care for the underserved and new culturally-sensitive approaches to patient lifetime compliance to home management of lymphedema.

Psychological Services for Breast Cancer Patients Undergoing Adjuvant Therapies: More than one third of patients with curable breast cancer drop out of prescribed chemotherapy, radiation and/or hormone therapy due to intolerable mental health side effects caused by these treatments. This program provides psychological services specifically to poor and medically underserved breast cancer patients undergoing adjuvant therapies. The services will target side effects such as depression, anxiety, mood liability associated with hot flashes, substance abuse relapse, fatigue and cognitive impairment.
